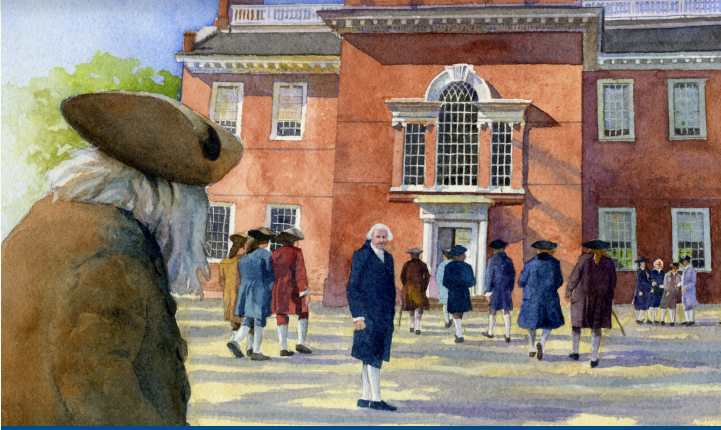
WINTER IN FRANKLIN SQUARE SPARKLES THROUGH FEBRUARY 28
